

News Worth Digging Up

Black Lights Turn This North Carolina Mine into a Psychedelic Wonderland

The Bon Ami Mine's deposits of the mineral hyalite glow fluorescent green under ultraviolet light

The Bon Ami Mine in Little Switzerland, North Carolina, located about 50 miles northeast of Asheville. About ten times a year the mine is open so people can experience its <u>Black Light Mine</u> <u>Tour</u>. The tour is the best way to see the mine's towering walls and ceiling, which are encrusted with large deposits of <u>hyalite</u>, a form of <u>opal</u> known for its glass-like transparency. When viewed under ultraviolet light, the normally colorless gemstone glows a brilliant fluorescent green.

Hyalite's intoxicating glow, which immediately calls to mind kryptonite from the *Superman* comic book series, is due to the gemstone's trace amounts of <u>uranium</u>, a chemical element that glows when exposed to ultraviolet light. The more uranium a hyalite deposit contains, the brighter it glows. The Bon Ami Mine is one of only two mines in the United States that are open to the public and offer black light tours. In this article, the history of the mine is discussed and the discovery of the hyalite is described in detail. The mine owner has purchased high powered black lights and leads the tours. The tour draws about 1000 tourists from around the world each year.
