"The Dacites of Yellowstone" By Kylie Moore

The November meeting will be a presentation on dacite occurrences in Yellowstone National Park. Dacite is a volcanic rock formed by rapid solidification of lava that is high in silica and low in alkali metal oxides. It has a fine-grained to porphyritic texture and is intermediate in composition between andesite and rhyolite. It is composed predominantly of plagioclase feldspar and quartz lava flows.

Proposed Changes to By-Laws to be voted on at Nov. Meeting **Article VII: Dues and Fees** Section I The amount of all dues and fees shall be determined or altered by a majority vote of members present and voting at a regular meeting. The price of workshop materials for sale shall be set by the workshop chairperson with approval of the Executive Committee. Section II Annual dues shall be payable by the first day of January. Annual dues shall be pro-rated semi-annually for new members only. Section III (initiation fee language deleted) Section III When an individual holding a family membership reaches the age of 18 and requests a change in membership standing, he shall be assessed dues on a pro-rated basis (initiation fee language deleted). Any member who has not paid his annual dues by the February meeting shall be classed Section IV as delinquent and not in good standing. The delinquent member shall be notified by the membership committee and, should the delinquency continue until March 1st, the delinquent member shall be dropped from membership.

GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

October 21, 2024, Monthly Meeting of Columbia Gem and Mineral Society

The Columbia Gem and Mineral Society, Inc. held its monthly meeting on October 21, 2024, at Hope Church. President Jim Cobb called the meeting to order at 7:28 PM. Jim thanked Tom and Patricia Stidom for bringing door prizes and welcomed new members.

Membership: Sheila Frame stated that there were 132 members: 110 adults and 22 juniors. **Programs:** The November program will be "Dacites of Yellowstone" given by Kylie Moore. The CGMS show will also take place November 22nd-24th. There will be a Christmas party on December 13th at the Cayce Historical Museum with a potluck and gift exchange.

Show Committee: The show is coming up fast in November! Angela Valvasori stated that the show is completely full with 35 dealers and that the layout of the show is complete. Terry Tokaz is setting up volunteer shifts for the show and stated that volunteers for the front desk would be appreciated. Most of the geode time slots are full. Terry stated that descriptions of the positions are available if anyone would like more information on what specific duties entail. For every 4 hours worked at the show, you will be entered for a chance to win a week-long scholarship for a lapidary class at William Holland! Ron Ahle stated that so far, only 3 display cases have been signed up to be filled, and more volunteers to put together display cases will be needed. One of the display cases will be the state stone, and two others will be fossils, so more mineral specimen or lapidary cases would be great. There was a grab bag assembly day at the workshop which made 400 \$2 bags, 200 \$10 bags, and 200 \$5 bags. More material will be needed for donation for next year's grab bags. The dealer dinner will have special chafing dishes, and aluminum pans are available for those bringing food. Avoid crockpots if possible due to uncertainty in the number of electrical outlets available. CGMS show T-shirts will be available for purchase at the show pending a vote of approval from the board.

BOARD MEETING MINUTES

October 28th, 2024, Board Meeting of the Columbia Gem and Mineral Society

The Columbia Gem and Mineral Society, Inc. held its monthly board meeting on October 28th, 2024, at Grecian Gardens at 2312 Sunset Blvd. President Jim Cobb called the meeting to order at 7:11 PM. Members in attendance were Jim Cobb, Angela Valvasori, Ron Ahle, Steve Coker, Cheryl Coker, Sharon Sterrett, Sheila Frame, Tom Stidom, Patricia Stidom, Gary Hert, and Sophie Grimsley.

Officer Reports:

President: Jim will be speaking sometime soon on WIS about the show.

Treasurer: Angela gave a summary of the club's finances, including new interest rates and our club's total assets.

Committee Reports:

Membership: There are 132 members: 110 adults and 22 juniors. Sheila stated that currently our new member dues have an extra dollar tacked on for seemingly no reason. There was speculation that this may have originally been to cover postage fees for new member letters, which are now sent by email. Sheila proposed that we reduce the new member fees of \$26 and \$31 dollars for individual membership and family memberships, respectively, to \$25 and \$30. Sheila also proposed that the prorated membership fees be prorated on for ½ a year, not every quarter. Angela stated that in order to adopt these changes, the club's constitution would need to be amended. This amendment must be voted on at a general meeting. She also stated that the constitution is due to be updated in 2025. Sheila Frame made a motion to make these changes and vote on the constitutional amendment at the November general meeting. Cheryl Coker seconded the motion, and all were in favor. A proposal will be made during the next general meeting on the constitution revisions. The proposed changes will be sent out in the November Rocky Trails for members to review.

Programs: Kylie Moore will be giving the November program on the Dacites of Yellowstone. The show will occur in November. There will be no general meeting in December, but there will be a Christmas Party December 13th. The board discussed reconnecting with Ashby Gale to clarify any future programs that he may give.

Show Committee: Angela Valvasori stated that there may be two budget changes to the prior approved show budget. First, she requested board approval for the creation and sale of t-shirts at the show. There was discussion of the cost for manufacturing the T-shirts and what they would sell for, as well as the design. Angela asked for a vote to approve the budget increase to accommodate the T-shirts, Sheila Frame seconded the motion, and all approved. Second, the cost of 4 billboards increased from last year and was higher than anticipated. This increase in budget was approved by email.

A discussion of vendor and volunteer name tags took place. There was a suggestion to print a few name tags with the vendor business names in addition to the expected names of the individuals working the vendor booths. The purple show flyers have the incorrect date. If you know someone who has taken one of these flyers, please reach out to let them know the correct dates of the show.

Angela stated that food trucks around Columbia have been contacted about putting a deposit down to be at the show and have contacted Angela to confirm. This was a scam, and we have not contacted any food trucks about the show as of now. There is a possibility of obtaining a food truck for Friday when the snack bar will not be open.

Ron mentioned that the display cases have not been filled, and members may need to be briefed on what the display cases are so that more people will volunteer. The security contract for the show for 2024-2026 has been revised to address our concerns, and additional changes will be reviewed before signing.

There was a successful grab bag workshop, and the club has plenty of material for the salted mine, which is ready to be transported to the show. Sue Shrader used to transport these but is still recovering from hip replacement surgery. We will need to figure out who can transport the material. The board also discussed the logistics of the ownership of the website and the possession of the show trailer keys. Security cameras will be installed before the show.

Steve Coker suggested that it may be a good idea for someone to bring a camera to the show and film each vendor to splice together for social media. It was mentioned that we could do this for vendors who had signed a waiver.

Workshop: The workshop is open, contact Gary Hert for access. The geode saw has been cleaned and is ready for the show. Tom Stidom asked if the club owned any faceting machines. Gary said that the club used to have them but no longer do. There was speculation by the board about where they might have ended up, and some thought old meeting minutes may be useful in determining who to contact about the machines.

Field trips: Nothing new.

Sunshine: Sue Shrader is still recovering from hip replacement surgery.

Newsletter: The date for the Christmas Party was incorrect in the last newsletter but will be

corrected in the next. **Historian:** No report.

Librarian: Need to go through boxes in storage unit. **Auctioneer:** Ron stated that we will need donations for another auction.

New Business: Sophie suggested that the November meeting be adjusted to have the program given first. There is a lot of club business to get through such as voting on the constitutional amendment, general club elections, door prizes, and descriptions of show needs such as display cases. In order to be accommodating for our speaker and guests, it would be better have the business meeting after the program and not rush the speaker at the end of the night.

A motion to conclude the meeting was made by Shiela Frame and seconded by Ron Ahle. The executive meeting concluded at 8:27 pm.

The October 19 show planning meeting was held at the Richland County Library on North Main St. from 4:00 pm to 5:30 pm.

Dealers and Layout: The show is full. Patricia and Tom managed to fit in one more dealer, for a total of 35 dealers. Tom provided the final show layout. One additional web release was received, dealer to be listed on the website. Patricia and Tom were told we will not have access to the area behind the fence behind the geode setup. Gary needs access to the breaker and for carrying hot water to wash the geodes, without going through the building through the crowd. Pat and Jim Carter presented a wonderful canvas apron with the club logo to Gary for the geode workers.

Volunteer Organization: Terri gave an update on volunteers to date (most want to work at geodes) and emphasized she needs the volunteer sheet filled out.

Dealer Dinner: Pat Carter asked Angela to bring the volunteer forms and aluminum pans to the October general meeting since she will be out of town.

Grand door prize: Sue will donate a grand door prize.

News Worth Digging Up

"Fossil Finds - Placoderms"

In a presentation I gave to the club this year, I talked about the evolution of fish on planet earth. One group of now extinct fish I discussed was the Placoderms, the armor-plated fishes, which were common during the Devonian. For fossil collectors, these are some of the oldest fish fossils that can be collected because their hard dermal plates lend themselves to fossilization. In the latest issue of Rock & Gem is an article on Placoderms.

The author offers a great synopsis on placoderms and their fossils. These fish had hard plates on their head section and the part of the thorax just behind the head. They also sported large flat bony plates. Since soft tissue generally does not fossilize, these plates are usually the only evidence we are able to find. Placoderms were a group of fish that had jaws but no teeth. Instead, they had "tooth-like" structures that extended down to the mouth, a continuation of the bony plates of the head. There was a great diversity in size and shape between the species.

Placoderms numbered around 400 different species and occupied fresh and saltwater environments. One of the largest placoderms was the Dunkleosteus which could grow to a length of 33 feet. Dunkleosteus was believed to be the largest predator during the Devonian. Fossils of this creature can be found in the shales near Cleveland, Ohio. One of the smallest was Bothriolepis which was only four inches at the widest part of the skullcap.

CGMS Field Trip to Graves Mountain

Lincoln, Georgia January 11th, 8am till 4 pm

The Columbia Gem and Mineral Society will have a fieldtrip to Graves Mountain on January 11, 2025. Graves Mountain has been a mecca for rockhounds for years. It is probably the most famous collecting site in Georgia. It is a premier location for large, multiple twinned rutile crystals; rutile, lazulite, pyrophyllite, kyanite, hematite, pyrite, ilmenite, muscovite, fuchsite, quartz crystals, and microcrystals. You can either surface collect or dig for minerals. There are also many boulders to bang on so may want to bring a sledgehammer and a chisel. Just a reminder, you will not be able to drive into the site so you will have to carry your tools.

Children under the age of 12 years old are not allowed on the mountain because of potential dangers involved. All pets must be kept under control and on a leash.

GRAVES MOUNTAIN CODE OF CONDUCT!

Park your vehicle in the designated area at the end of the paved access road.

ALL pets must be kept under control and on a leash. The caretaker, Jr. Norman has final and absolute say as to where you may safely work. Ladders or power tools of any kind will not be allowed. (HAND TOOLS ONLY!). STAY AWAY FROM ALL HIGH WALLS! NO RAPPELLING OFF OF ANYTHING! NO ONE IS ALLOWED TO DRIVE THEIR VEHICLE ON ANY PART OF GRAVES MOUNTAIN BEYOND THE PARKING AREA! (The caretaker must accompany anyone driving beyond the parking area!) EVERYONE NEEDS TO BE OFF THE MOUNTAIN BY 6:00 p.m. (Absolutely no one is allowed on Graves Mountain after dark.)

DIRECTIONS: From Washington Georgia, drive east 11 miles on SR-378, look for mine entrance on right. From the Hardee's in Lincolnton, Georgia, drive approximately 5-1/2 miles west on SR-378. Look for the sign at the entrance to Graves Mountain on the left side of the road. It is a little over a two-hour drive from Columbia.

Orionids September 26th, 2024, to November 22nd, 2024 Next Peak night **Oct 20-21, 2024**

The Orionids are a medium strength shower that sometimes reaches high strength activity. In a normal year, the Orionids produce 10-20 shower members at maximum. In exceptional years, such as 2006-2009, the peak rates were on par with the Perseids (50-75 per hour). Recent displays have produced low to average displays of this shower. In 2024, a waning gibbous moon will rise during the late evening hours and will severely hamper views of this display.

Southern Taurids September 23rd, 2024, to December 8th, 2024 Next Peak night **Nov 4-5, 2024**

The Southern Taurids are a long-lasting shower that several peaks during its activity period. The shower is active for more than two months but rarely produces more than five shower members per hour, even at maximum activity. The Taurids (both branches) are rich in fireballs and are often responsible for increased number of fireball reports from September through November.

Northern Taurids

Next period of activity: October 13th, 2024, to December 2nd, 2024

Next Peak night Nov 11-12, 2024

This shower is much like the Southern Taurids, just active a bit later in the year. When the two showers are active simultaneously in late October and early November, there is sometimes a notable increase in the fireball activity.

Leonids

Next period of activity: November 3rd, 2024, to December 2nd, 2024

Next Peak night Nov 16-17, 2024
